Suzanne Holt - Office of Economic Development

Bernadette Andreasson has been promoted to Senior Economic Developer along with Evelyn Heinbeck. Kayleen Scali confidential secretary/administrative assistant with marketing talent has been added to the team.



The Coalition for Belleayre – aka Coalition to Save Belleayre – came into existence in 1986 to counteract the scheduled permanent closing of the Belleayre Mountain Ski Center. It brought together a broad group of citizens and organizations, skiers, employees, civic and business leaders, and elected officials from all over the state. That battle was hard fought and won and as a result we have Belleayre Ski Center as a lynch pin of our regional economy. Since that battle the Coalition has been in continuous operation. Its sole objective is to advocate for the funding, management, marketing and oversight required to make Belleayre all that it can be as a community and state asset.

Concerns for the languishing support for Belleayre under DEC oversight led to legislative action bringing Belleayre under the auspices of The Olympic Regional Development Authority (ORDA). The transition included legislation to assure that Belleayre had robust representation designating two seats on the ORDA Board of Directors with one representative each residing in Delaware and Ulster Counties. The current Ulster County representative appointed by the Governor is John Parete.

During Mr. Parete's tenure on the ORDA Board, significant progress has been made at Belleayre including investment in state-of-the-art grooming equipment, the purchase of air compressors to extend snowmaking through the entire season, new high efficiency snow guns, updated electrical infrastructure, and of course the Catskill Thunder Gondola to name just a few. This year skiers will arrive to an expanded deck with a larger locker area underneath the historic Overlook Lodge. The increase in young families coming to the mountain has lead to the engineering and architectural work necessary for an expansion of the Discovery Lodge in the following year.

Coalition members recently became aware of a resolution under discussion in the Economic Development, Tourism, et al Committee to nominate a new person to the seat currently held by Mr. Parete. The Coalition, having invested considerable time, resources and energy to the support of Belleayre over the past 30 years, is surprised and concerned regarding this action for several reasons.

First: There is no opening on the ORDA Board. Members sit until the Governor makes their replacement.

Second: Why would the Legislator from New Paltz, with no apparent connections to or knowledge of Belleayre, feel compelled to recommend that the sitting ORDA Board Member be replaced?

Third: Significant progress has been made at the Mountain under ORDA leadership, which is successful in drawing more and more young families into the area for the benefit of Ulster County Businesses and Communities. The overall status of our ORDA Board Representation has been positive.

Fourth: This action being taken without consultation with those most directly impacted by the proposed change and without consultation or notice to the Town Board of Shandaken, wherein Belleayre is located, is unconscionable.

We suggest that the facts point to the Committee and the Legislature abandoning this effort as the most sensible action going forward.


If there are specific concerns that suggest a change is in order, we feel it essential that we are asked to be included in the conversation prior to any action steps. It is certainly appropriate, prudent and vital that the Town Board of Shandaken be involved with this process as well. To proceed without these entities involved seems opaque, backdoor, and smacking of cronyism.

In closing, it is essential that this seat continue to be filled with interest, dedication, knowledge and experience as the only criteria; and that an open, transparent, and inclusive process be followed if there is a vacancy in the future. The Coalition is armed with significant information that has assisted, working with abutting Town Boards, in garnering many millions of additional investments in Belleayre over the past two years, and we look forward to being involved in continued successful advocacy.

As you know Belleayre Mountain Ski Center is wholly located within the Town of Shandaken and Ulster County. Belleayre has and continues to be one of the, if not the, largest economic drivers for the Town of Shandaken and the Central Catskill Corridor. Outside of my capacity as Town Supervisor, I have been an avid Skier and Snowboarder for near 40 years, have raised my family enjoying the sport and built life lasting friendships and relationships with many of the visitors and employees. Having been personally involved as a Ski Instructor for more than 30 years and as a business owner I can attest to the direct impact Belleayre's season has on the local economies. I was personally involved when Belleayre was under control of the NYS DEC and the need developed to move Belleayre from DEC to the Olympic Regional Development Authority (ORDA). I was involved with the local parties, including representatives from the Coalition to Save Belleayre, the Catskill Watershed Corporation, the Central Catskill Chamber of Commerce, the Chair of the Delaware County Board of Supervisors and the Ulster County Executive's Office to draft the legislation to move Belleayre to ORDA's control. We specifically created language to ensure that we had proper representation on both the ORDA Executive Board as well as at the Community Advisory level. We needed to ensure that Belleayre's voice would be heard in Lake Placid.

We then made recommendations for the appointments and the choices were clear from the start as Joe Kelly of Delaware County had championed keeping Belleayre open since the 1980's and John Parete, then Ulster County Legislator, had carried the torch for Belleayre through his political clout and acumen. Both Mr. Kelly and Mr. Parete continued to serve the Belleayre community well regarding providing us a direct line of information concerning the Ski Center, proposed activities and relaying concerns from the public and business owners alike at the multiple meetings they attended. Mind you they serve on a volunteer basis with no compensation and have to make several trips to Lake Placid to attend Board meetings in order to address all of these issues. They have been instrumental in helping secure funding for Belleayre and specifically argued on Belleayre's behalf for \$8 million in capital investments at Belleayre when initially only Gore and Whiteface (the two other ORDA operated ski centers) were to receive funding. The \$8 million dollars was the catalyst for the installation of the new Catskill Thunder Gondola which has dramatically transformed the mountain and improved skier visits and experience. Recently, Joe Kelly from Delaware County resigned and they are in process of appointing a replacement for his seat.

I have deep concerns regarding recent activities regarding the Ulster County Legislature and what seemed to be highly guarded intentions to replace Mr. Parete as the Ulster County representative on the ORDA Board. Mr. Parete has not stepped down and the Governor has not asked for a replacement. Ulster County's representation has been highly successful, so why are you moving to replace him? There has been no inquiry to



anyone involved with Belleayre or the Town of Shandaken Town Board regarding looking for a replacement. Additionally, myself and Tom White, were appointed by the Legislature for the ORDA Community Advisory Panel. We would have provided input sooner if involved. I'm also not sure why this is being introduced by the Legislator from New Paltz and not from the Legislator elected to represent our District.

This action is not representative of the type of governing that I am accustomed. Neither I nor the Town Board would make a decision that could affect a single Hamlet or neighborhood without speaking to those who it would directly effect. I certainly would not be proposing some legislation that would affect New Paltz, without talking to their Board or at least the Town Supervisor. We are elected to represent the people and if there is a group of people, as is such with Belleayre, who are familiar with the needs and workings of a topic, why would you not reach out to them for some guidance? That seems a foolhardy move destined to fail without concern for its outcome.

I ask that you pull this proposed legislation. This type of legislation and action is a slap in the face to the people who have vested their lives in Belleayre, who have worked tirelessly as advocates, and who continue work to ensure Belleayre provide the best product it can for the betterment and continued improvement of our tourism-based economy in the Town of Shandaken, Ulster County and the Central Catskill Region.

If in the future a vacancy does occur, I would hope that the Ulster County Legislature use an open, transparent process that would be inclusive of the breadth of knowledge available from a variety of interests who have and continue to be advocates for Belleayre, it's culture and the community at large.

Re: Summary of Field Notes-Site Visit: Kingston Midtown Linear Park- Public Safety Project

Date: September 4, 2018

Purpose

On August 30th, I performed a project site walkover in Kingston along the former rail corridor extending from Downs Street to the Kingston Plaza/Westbrook Lane. This is the location of the Kingston Midtown Linear Park-Public Safety Project. The project entails the removal of track and ties and the rough grading of the existing railbed to improve vehicular access for public safety purposes. The site walk over encompassed an examination of the track area as well as observations of the adjacent corridor. The purpose of the site walkover and this memo is to document any conditions of environmental concern pertinent to the proposed scope of work.

Site Description

The project corridor is a total of 0.35 miles and the extent of disturbance will be limited to the immediate corridor area (12 feet in width). During the site walkover, observations were made on soils, hydrology, vegetation, existence of potential significant habitat as well as any other conditions of environmental concern. In general, from a natural history perspective, the intersection of the corridor with Albany Avenue serves as a fairly distinct divider of soils, hydrology and to some extent vegetation. This corresponds with the surficial geology of the area in which areas to the east and south of Albany Avenue are glacial till deposits and areas to the west and north are generally glacial lake outwash. As such, I have grouped observations accordingly.

I - Downs Street to Albany Avenue

The corridor in this section starts out at grade at Downs Street and progressively cuts below grade ultimately to approximately twelve feet below the adjacent surface elevation by the Albany Avenue underpass. Accordingly, the embankment areas (which are generally beyond the limits of disturbance for this project) grow steeper and somewhat broader moving from Downs Street to Albany Avenue.

The soils in this area were found to be consistent with the soils maps which indicate Riverhead fine sandy loam and as such are well drained. There were no indicators of standing water in this area and it was dry at the time of the site visit. Vegetation in this area was not remarkable nor were there any other hydric indicators (wetland vegetation, matted/stained leaves or other indicators of standing water or high groundwater). Typical species in this area include: various asters (Aster sp), goldenrod (Solidago sp.), staghorn sumac (Rhus typhina), pin cherry (Prunus sp.), jewelweed (Impatiens capensis), and tearthumb (Polygonum sagittatum). Of note, was a large and dense stand of Japanese knotweed (Fallopia japonica) along the western side of the corridor, the knotweed is thickest from Downs street to Elmendorf. Knotweed stem and root segments can easily grow new colonies and extra care should be taken to not disturb any existing areas with knotweed to help prevent the further spread of this invasive species along the corridor.

There were not any significant hydrology or drainage features in this segment and the area appears well drained under most conditions.

II- Albany Avenue to I-587

In this segment, the corridor continues significantly below grade, with steep embankment cuts on both side of the tracks, for approximately two hundred feet until natural land surface elevation slopes down as one moves off the glacial terrace and towards the Esopus Creek and its floodplain area. The areas within the first two hundred feet of the Albany Avenue overpass have the steepest embankments of the entire corridor and there is evidence of drainage and some erosion at the edge of the track corridor through this area. In general, there is significantly more water moving through the landscape in this section of the project than in the segment from Down Street to Albany Avenue.

The mapped soils in this area move abruptly from the well-drained Riverhead sandy loams closer to Albany Avenue to Plainfield-Riverhead complex, Canandaigua silt loam, and Raynham silt loam. Canandaigua silt loam is considered a hydric soil in New York, one which is often associated with wetlands. Emergent wetland vegetation (e.g. *Typha sp., Lythrium* salicaria) are visible on either side of the corridor through this section of the corridor corresponding with the areas of mapped Canandaigua soil.

Additional species that were observed in this segment of the corridor include: black walnut (*Juglans nigra*), grapevine (*Vitus sp*), tearthumb (*Polygonum sagittatum*), staghorn sumac (*Rhus typhina*), Virginia creeper (*Parthenocissus quinquefolia*) and willow (*Salix sp.*).

Summary & Recommendations

Based on available information through the NYSDEC environmental mapper and the USFWS IPaC database, no species of concern were identified in the existing corridor area. The project site walk over confirmed this information; no animal species, plant species or significant habitats were noted in the corridor during the site walk over.

Some wetland vegetation and wetland areas exist between Albany Avenue and I-587. In addition, Japanese knotweed is thick in the adjacent area between Downs and Albany Avenue. Project boundaries should be well marked during construction to prevent any inadvertent removal or placement of fill in these areas.
