Good evening members of the Ulster County Legislature. My name is Joe Bergstein and I am here on behalf of the Town of New Paltz Environmental Conservation Board. In addition, the Village of New Paltz's Environmental Policy Board is supportive of my effort here this evening.

We were encouraged when the Village of New Paltz approved a plastic bag ban in April, 2015. That local law encourages shoppers to bring their own bags when purchasing items in grocery stores located in the Village of New Paltz. At that time five other municipalities in New York State had taken a similar action. Unfortunately the decision of these few communities and others in the state since, has not eradicated the problems associated with plastic carryout bags. Only an estimated 5 percent of these bags are recycled.

With this in mind, our Board concurs with the County Legislature's proposed ban on single use checkout bags along with a mandatory charge on recyclable paper checkout bags. This hybrid solution has been highly effective elsewhere in reducing plastic bag use and encouraging the switch to reusable bags.

We are pleased that the proposed ban covers a broad range of businesses that sell personal, consumer and household items as indicated in Section 3 of the draft legislation. We do question, however, the apparent exemption from the ban of plastic bags that are used by clothing retailers, dry cleaners and pharmacies also discussed in Section 3, as there are non-plastic alternatives for use in these businesses. We would like to suggest that these retail businesses also be included in the ban to help curb the high volume of plastic potentially released into the environment.

In a related matter, we suggest that legislation be considered to reduce the use of plastic straws, beverage stirrers and plastic utensils in the food services sector. Perhaps it is the intent of the legislature to move in a step-wise fashion and in the future address these other single-use plastic products that are routinely dispensed. While the estimates vary on how long these products may linger in the environment, what has been demonstrated is that as they break down, they are assimilated by animals and plants and pose adverse impacts on land and aquatic environments.

Even without further revision, the Town of New Paltz Environmental Conservation Board believes that the proposed law is a positive step in the right direction. In closing, we understand that the local law is to take effect on Earth Day on April 22^{nd} 2019. The intervening ten months afford the opportunity to inform all retailers and members of the community about the legislation. Our Board will be happy to assist in this effort. Let's work together to make unnecessary single-use plastic products a thing of the past!

Riverkeeper Strongly Supports Local Law 10 Testimony of Jeremy Cherson, Advocacy Coordinator June 19, 2018

I would like to thank the Ulster County Legislature for the opportunity to testify today to endorse Local Law 10 on behalf of Riverkeeper's thousands of members and supporters.

Through advocacy, prevention, community education and stewardship, Riverkeeper is working towards realizing our vision of a trash-free Hudson. Our annual day of service, the Riverkeeper Sweep, engages thousands of New Yorkers from Brooklyn to the Adirondacks at over 100 sites to clean-up our shorelines and waterways. Over the past 7 years, plastic bag pollution has constituted one of the main sources of the marine debris at the Riverkeeper Sweep. In many cases, we can see at a single clean-up site, the cycle of degradation occurring, with recent litter sitting beside smaller and smaller pieces that accumulate on the shore. Pesticides, toxic industrial compounds—including PCBs—as well as pharmaceuticals and other unregulated contaminants adhere to plastics, and can both contaminate fish and contaminate drinking water supplies.¹ Our direct experience with microplastic pollution on our shorelines necessitates our advocacy to eliminate the scourge of plastic bag pollution in the Hudson River Estuary.

Evidence compiled by the New York State Plastic Bag Task Force shows that recyclables handling recovery facilities (RHRF's) and materials recovery facilities (MRF's) incur high extra operational costs as a result of single-use plastic bag-related issues. These costs can range up to \$1 million and can be attributed to wear on equipment, screen cleaning, and employee time dedicated to fixing equipment jams from plastic bag contamination. Although it is possible, there is currently no economic feasibility or viable market for recycling single-use plastic bags. One estimate shows that it can cost up to \$4,000 to recycle one ton of plastic bags, while the end product can only be sold for \$32.²

A plastic bag policy that imposes a ban on single-use plastic bags, with an additional fee on paper bags and other alternatives is critical to significantly reduce microplastic pollution, control negative externalities associated with a potential increase in paper bag use, and encourage consumers to use reusable bags. After implementing such a policy in San Jose, reusable bag use increased from 4% to 62%.³ Los Angeles County saw a 94% decline in plastic bag use and a 30% decline in paper bag use after a ban on plastic and a 10-cent fee on paper was implemented.⁴
