

**Requesting New York State Governor Cuomo And The New York State Legislature To Promote Access To School-Based Mental Health Clinic Treatment Services By Eliminating Financial Obstacles**

Referred to: The Health And Personnel Committee (Chairman Aiello and Legislators Belfiglio, Robert Parete, Ronk, and Provenzano)

Legislator Robert S. Parete offers the following:

WHEREAS, mental health problems significantly affect the ability of youth to attend school and succeed academically; and

WHEREAS, access to school-based Mental Health Clinic treatment services has been demonstrated to improve school attendance and academic performance by improving access to treatment; and

WHEREAS, these benefits generate local financial savings through increased education State aid related to attendance and decreased special education expenses; and

WHEREAS, school-based treatment services are particularly needed in rural counties where families are often unable to travel great distances to licensed clinics; and

WHEREAS, the stigmatization of people dealing with mental health issues combined with the economic pressures on schools has reduced access to mental health services in Ulster County; and

WHEREAS, school-based treatment services do not generate enough revenues to be financially self-sufficient; and

WHEREAS, it is therefore necessary for counties or school districts to fund the portion of “net deficit” operating expenses that are not covered by revenues; and

WHEREAS, counties and school districts are under pressure to maintain or reduce local tax levies; and

WHEREAS, Chapter 97 of the Laws of 2011 (Property Tax Cap) established a tax levy limit that affects all school districts in Ulster County and a host of other independent taxing entities such as library, fire and water districts. Under this law, the growth in the property tax levy, the total amount to be raised through property taxes charged on the municipality's taxable assessed value of property, is capped at 2 percent or the rate of inflation, whichever is less, with some exceptions; and

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WHEREAS, recent funding cuts to Ulster County-based mental health programs have only exacerbated this gap in services; and

WHEREAS, this pressure is an impediment to the financing and availability of mental health treatment services in our schools; and

WHEREAS, it is imperative that government develop a financing plan to overcome this impediment so that all students have the opportunity to attain academic success and to promote a more productive society; and

WHEREAS, the Children and Families Services Unit of the Ulster County Mental Health Department was eliminated from the 2013 Ulster County Budget “to better position the county financially for the future”; now, therefore be it,

RESOLVED, the Ulster County Legislature hereby requests that Governor Cuomo and the New York State Legislature develop plans to eliminate financial obstacles to the establishment of school-based Mental Health Clinic treatment services by subsidizing these services at appropriate levels; and, be it further

RESOLVED, that the Clerk of the Ulster County Legislature shall forward copies of this resolution to Governor Andrew Cuomo, New York State Comptroller Thomas DiNapoli, Senate Majority Coalition Leader Dean Skelos, Senate Minority Leader John Sampson, Assembly Speaker Sheldon Silver, Assembly Minority Leader Brian Kolb, New York State Senators John J. Bonacic, Cecilia Tkaczyk, James Seward and William J. Larkin, Jr., New York State Members of Assembly Kevin A. Cahill, Claudia Tenney, Peter D. Lopez and Frank Skartados, the New York State Association of Counties, and the New York State Association of Social Workers, and move its adoption.
