- Goals are measured if they move on to clean and sober housing. Have had good success.
- Darmstadt Shelter serves single individuals primarily recovering from substance abuse
- Family Inn serves homeless families
- Family House serves runaway youth 12-18 yrs of age
- Washbourne House serves our domestic violence victims
- Long Term Housing Programs (HUD) serves chronically homeless as long as 18 months (most people in this program are substance abusers) Success rate is 75%.
- All residents of these programs are here voluntarily can leave when they want
- One time offering for homeless too many people to serve
- Some come back and work within the program to help others in need
- Collaboration w/Rupco served 201 families in 2010 \$1million grant to cover administrative as well as assistance support for homeless.
- Quality of Child Care has declined in our community the federal government created "exempt care" which allows untrained individuals to oversee less than 3 children at home without having a license or training. Kids end up being put in front of the TV and are not prepared for 1st grade. 330 exempt providers - a concern
- Quality food preparation and distribution has grown around the county, Saunderskill, Gill and Davenport have provided. 2009 Family distributed on Tuesdays and Thursday to pantries 29K lbs. of vegetables. 2010 distributed 59K lbs. to 18 different feeding programs and food pantries.
- Evaluating feasibility to bid on the meals on wheels contract. Wants to also meet needs in Ellenville.
- Children lack a healthy meal during the summer months available only during the school year
- Not for profit organization very important to food distribution in community
- Asked to changed pantry hours of operation to accommodate the demands of <u>working</u> family needs
- Housing a concern, family's starting out can not afford housing losing our young peopleasking for real help from the committee, people are really struggling
- Our average salary is the 27^{th} lowest in the state. Our housing is the 12^{th} most expensive in the state.

Resolutions:

1.) <u>Resolution No. 87, April 26, 2011</u>: Amending The 2011 Ulster County Budget For Investigative Services For Department Of Social Services - District Attorney

Motion offered to move Resolution forward by Legislator Harris, Seconded by Legislator Loughran, Unanimously in Favor, Carried.

Note: Commissioner Rodriguez attended mtg. to explain the back ground for funding - contract specifically designed for the Sunoco investigation noting this is an anomaly, also time sensitive. Leg. Petit would like to see a full time position be created to address these types of issues - feels it would save tax payer's money. Leg. Frey thanked the commissioner and his staff for all their hard work.

2.) <u>Resolution No. 89, April 26, 2011</u>: Authorizing The Chairman Of The Ulster County Legislature To Execute A Contract And Any Amendments To The Contract With The New York State Department Of Health Lead Poisoning Prevention Program - Department Of Health

Motion offered to move Resolution forward by Legislator Parete, Seconded by Legislator Harris, Unanimously in Favor, Carried.

3.) <u>Resolution No. 90, April 26, 2011</u>: Consenting To A Subordination Agreement During The Purchasing Process For The Sale Of The County's Certified Home Health Agency License And Long-Term Home Health Care Program License - Department Of Health

Discussion ensued about the time line and delay of completion of sale - thus a Motion offered by Legislator Loughran to <u>table</u> resolution to provide more information for committee, Seconded by Legislator Harris, Unanimously in Favor, Carried. When time to vote Leg. Parete stated he will be a no vote. Chairman Frey will schedule another mtg. to vote the night of Session 4/26/11.

4.) <u>Resolution No. 93, April 26, 2011</u>: Authorizing The Chairman Of The Ulster County Legislature to Execute An Inter-Municipal Agreement For The Preschool Special Education And Related Services Program With The Onteora Central School District - Department Of Social Services

Motion offered to move Resolution forward by Legislator Parete, Seconded by Legislator Loughran, Unanimously in Favor, Carried.

5.) <u>Resolution No. 94, April 26, 2011</u>: Authorizing The Chairman Of The Ulster County Legislature To Execute An Agreement With The New York State Office Of Children And Family Safety Program - Department Of Social Services

Motion offered to move Resolution forward by Legislator Loughran, Seconded by Legislator Harris, Unanimously in Favor, Carried.

6.) Resolution No. 100, April 26, 2011: Requiring Healthy - Vending Options In County Buildings

Legislator Parete intention is to share this draft resolution with the committee for their input and review only at this time. Committee discussion resulted in consideration of removal of the last resolve. Leg. Parete asked committee to email him with any additional concerns. The committee will consider the resolution at next months meeting.
