Chairman Wawro asked SUNY Ulster President Alan Roberts to address the committee. President Roberts reported on enrollment. Fall 2016 ended 15 FTEs above budget. Winternet 2017 was flat, and Spring 2017 is 40 FTEs above budget. President Roberts reported that the College is ahead of last summer by 5 FTEs. Deputy Chairman Donaldson asked President Roberts what he thought was responsible for the change. President Roberts explained some of the changes he has initiated: staff working five days in the summer and eliminating the prerequisites for summer courses. President Roberts also credited the recruiters and marketing folks with increasing enrollment for the summer. President Roberts reported that the fund balance is about \$850,000. President Roberts shared that the College is still working in conjunction with Empire to bring a B.S. in Nursing to campus. President Roberts reported that Assemblyman Cahill is requesting support of a line item to help support this program. President Roberts reported that the College has begun the budgeting process for next year. President Roberts reported that the College will be budgeting flat. President Roberts reported that all the data being reviewed shows that high school graduation rates will drop eight or nine percent. The College plans to offset the decline with the adult market. President Roberts explained this market to be made up of adults, the Prison Program, and the B.S. in Nursing. President Roberts reported that the Prison Program is exploding; there are eighty students ready to begin. Legislator Donaldson asked who is paying for these students. President Roberts shared that Hudson Link is paying for the students through private donors. President Roberts shared that Sean Pica, Executive Director of Hudson Link will be the keynote speaker at graduation. A brief discussion ensued regarding recidivism rates.

Chairman Wawro asked Cornell Cooperative Extension of Ulster County (CCEUC) to address the committee. Melanie Forstrom and Christian Malsatzki presented on behalf of Cornell Cooperative Extension of Ulster County. Melanie Forstrom and Christian Malsatzki gave a brief overview of the programs and initiatives that take place because of County funds. Melanie Forstrom reported that the 4-H Public Speaking event will take place on Saturday, March 18th. Melanie Forstrom briefly discussed agricultural literacy and community service/civic engagement. Christian Malsatzki introduced himself and shared his background. Christian Malsatzki shared that his background is in urban agriculture. Christian Malsatzki reported that Cornell Cooperative of Ulster County serves just under 500 farms. Christian Malsatzki noted that these numbers come from the most recent census (2012). Christian Malsatzki reported that the USDA census is due this year. These farms produce about fifty-five million dollars' worth of goods. Christian Malsatzki explained that County dollars help to build programming and resources for farmers. Christian Malsatzki briefly discussed that Master Gardeners (they assist residential gardeners) and shared that they have logged about \$65,000.00 in volunteer hours.

Deputy Chairman Donaldson stated that he is proud to move this resolution forward. Deputy Chairman Donaldson stated that Cornell Cooperative quadruples the donation made to them by the County, and added that Cornell Cooperative is the best economic development impact that we have in any of the money we give out.

Chairman Wawro asked Arts Mid-Hudson to address the committee. Linda Marston-Reid, Executive Director of Arts Mid-Hudson, brought a "report card" to share with the committee. Linda Marston-Reid reported that she was proud to see that local artists have been able to hire staff and get more volunteers. Linda Marston-Reid reported that many local artists have been able to make more money for themselves. Linda Marston-Reid briefly discussed Art Walk Kingston. Linda Marston-Reid reported that over 70 artists participated. Twenty-three percent of the people visiting Art Walk Kingston were from (New York City, Connecticut, and Massachusetts). Linda Marston-Reid pointed out that these art events help support tourism.

Legislator Schwartz Berky asked about the artists who received awards, and whether or not they have reported back their results. Linda Marston-Reid reported that the artists who received awards in 2016 will have to report back by August. Linda Marston-Reid stated that she would share the results once they were received. Legislator Schwartz Berky asked about the results from 2015 as well, reminding Linda Marston-Reid about a previous discussion on whether or not the funding was worthwhile. Legislator Schwartz Berky added that she would like to have the results to share with

and remind her colleagues on the Economic Development Committee, and make sure they are aware of the impact. Deputy Chairman Donaldson commended Arts Mid-Hudson on their process for deciding who receives the awards. Deputy Chairman Donaldson encouraged the committee members to go to the awards presentation.

Legislator Delaune stated that he would recuse himself from voting as his wife is a recipient. Legislator Delaune added that he wished he could vote because Arts Mid-Hudson did a great job.

Chairman Wawro asked Family of Woodstock to address the committee. Michael Berg, Director of Family of Woodstock, reported that he wished the numbers were lower in his Supervised Visitation program. Director Berg reported that they are currently working with 77 families. The program has been very active. They have scheduled 438 visits, held 350 visits, and reported to the court 147 times. Director Berg explained the difference in scheduled vs. held visits by stating that many times the custodial parent will cancel the visit. Director Berg stated that he was proud of the work being done at Family of Woodstock.

Deputy Chairman Donaldson stated that it is a sad situation, but he is proud of the work being done at Family of Woodstock. Chairman Wawro asked Director Berg to briefly discuss an upcoming event (Chocolate Lovers' Brunch). Director Berg shared that the event will be held at Diamond Mills in Saugerties on March 19th at 1:00 p.m. The brunch will benefit at-risk youth in Ulster County.

The Bardavon took over UPAC in 2006 and merged in 2007. Executive Director Silva reported that since the merger, attendance has increased from 10,000 to 50,000. There has been an increase in programming as well as placing artists in the schools and bringing students to UPAC. Executive Director Silva shared that a Community Day is being developed. Community Day will take place at the end of April in midtown. Executive Director Silva reported that \$3,000,000.00 worth of renovations have been made already and they are hoping to accept a bid for another \$4,000,000.00 for HVAC. Fixing the HVAC will allow UPAC to be open three more months per year. Deputy Chairman Donaldson asked about collaboration with the private sector. Executive Director Silva reported that it is in the works and he will "shout it from the roof tops" when it happens.

Chairman Wawro asked the Ulster County Library Association to address the committee. Director Margaret Menard and Director Pam Stocking addressed the committee. The Ulster County Library Association is a voluntary consortium set up to help the libraries work better together. Ulster County is split up between two library systems. Director Menard shared what they do with County funding. For the past ten years, they have really focused on online and digital resources. The Library Association has worked to make these resources available to all resident of Ulster County no matter where you live. Director Menard acknowledged that there are some resources that resident would need to come to the libraries to access, but for the most part resources are accessible from everyone's home. Deputy Chairman Donaldson asked how often the resources the libraries offer are being reassessed. Director Menard stated they are reassessed every time they come up for renewal. Legislator Schwartz Berky asked if the libraries coordinator with the schools regarding overdrive, summer reading lists, and Battle of the Books. Director Menard stated that the libraries do coordinate with the schools, and added that a resource the libraries provide is called Brain Pop, which the school librarians are using. Legislator Schwartz Berky asked about accessing the Foundation Center. Director Menard stated that it can't be accessed remotely, but is available in Kingston. Legislator Schwartz Berky asked about webinars, and a brief discussion ensued. Legislator Bartels asked for stats regarding library cards. Director Menard shared that over 50% of residents have a library card. Legislator Bartels suggested making the communities more aware of the services the libraries offer. Director Menard shared that the Library Association does so through social media efforts, both the Association and the individual libraries. Legislator Bartels suggested having something added to the County website about the Ulster County Library Association's services. A brief discussion ensued regarding wifi. Legislator Lopez asked about how the libraries accommodate persons with various disabilities. Legislator Lopez suggested that the Ulster County Library Association reach out to RCAL to discuss possibilities and what is needed.

Executive Director Greg Howard reported on some of the programs and initiatives Community Action has been working on. Executive Director Howard reported that HEAP has been in high demand this year. Executive Director Howard shared that they participated in the backpack program and have given about 80 students backpacks filled with personal products as well as school supplies; 10 in Highland, 10 in Ellenville, and 60 in Kingston. Executive Director Howard reported that the staff is seeing a need for emergency rental assistance. Executive Director Howard reported that they work very closely with United Way. Executive Director Howard reported that many schools are getting involved in the Healthy Snacks program, leaving little need for Community Action to help, so they are hoping to repurpose the grant money for emergency rental assistance. Executive Director Howard reported that he is spending much of his time trying to build partnerships. Executive Director Howard reported that Community Action has received a grant to rehab their building. Legislator Donaldson stated that Greg brings a nice touch to the organization. A brief discussion ensued regarding the shift of money from the backpack program. Executive Director Howard also reported that they are working with Catholic Charities and the Workforce Justice Bureau to help assist with immigration needs. Executive Director Howard also reported that they are working on Medicaid medical transportation. This program will help those with drug addictions get to their appointments. Executive Director Howard is hoping to build relationships with Kelly McMullen (Office For The Aging) and her volunteers who drive Medicare patients. Executive Director Howard is hoping to find volunteers to drive Medicaid patients.

Chairman Wawro asked the Ulster County Youth Board to address the committee. Director Evelyn Clarke reported that Stephen Hack and John McCormick are very active and anxious to be back on the board. Director Clarke briefly reported on current programs. Director Clarke stated that she wants the programs to be a positive experience not just a place to hang out after school. Director Clarke briefly discussed Family House and the Mid Way Program. Director Clarke discussed Youth Helping Youth. Youth Helping Youth has collected items for youth in need. High schools students (Saugerties and New Paltz) collect items for youth in need and then donate those items to a shelter. Director Clarke reported that the Volunteer Recognition Program will be holding its third ceremony this April. Last year 125 people attended, this includes volunteers, parents, siblings, and adults. The ceremony will be held at SUNY Ulster on April 19th at 6:00 p.m. in the Student Lounge. Director Clarke stated that the youth respond well to this program. Chairman Wawro opened the floor for discussion on Resolution No. 89. Deputy Chairman Donaldson discussed the idea of holding parents accountable, like the social host law. Discussion ensued. County Attorney Bob Fisher pointed out that a party is hard to conceal, where as a cell phone is easily concealed. County Attorney Fisher did acknowledge that parents should not be turning a blind eye, but pointed out that 99.9% of parents are not aware cyberbullying is taking place. County Attorney Fisher added that software creators are sinister. County Attorney Fisher added that he does not want to turn kids into criminals, but 2016 is a different world. Deputy Chairman Donaldson stated that he does not see this making things better. Chairman Wawro stated that the law will allow us to protect victims we can't yet help. Deputy Chairman Donaldson stated that this becomes a class issue. Legislator Bartels raised the question of mandated reporters. Discussion ensued. Legislator Bartels shared Deputy Chairman Donaldson's concern about criminalizing the youth. Discussion ensued regarding the workload increase to prosecute cyberbullying offenders. Legislator Schwartz Berky questioned if schools would report less. County Attorney Fisher reported that schools have reported less across the board since DASA.

Legislator Schwartz Berky expressed frustration regarding the meetings held with the schools. Legislator Schwartz Berky requested to be part of the meetings and was never notified when Mr. Ronk and Mr. Crannell met with the schools. Legislator Schwartz Berky is very concerned about this. Deputy Chairman Donaldson added that he appointed Legislator Schwartz Berky to be part of these meetings. Legislator Schwartz Berky stated that she made it very clear to them that she was interested in attending these meetings. Legislator Schwartz Berky stated that since she didn't get to attend the meetings it a little late for her to see what the schools were doing in regards to prevention education. Legislator Schwartz Berky stated that the committee would like to convene the superintendents to propose a prevention education program and to see how the Legislature could work with the schools to put the prevention program in place. Legislator Schwartz Berky stated that it's too late for the schools to put money aside into discretionary funds. Legislator Schwartz Berky stated that it's a matter of leverage and double the work to consult with the schools, as a result of being left out of the meetings with the schools. Chairman Wawro called for a vote on Resolution No. 89.
